ACSD EARNS "A" ON STATE OF OHIO 2018-19 REPORT CARD

The Ohio Department of Education has released the district report cards for the 2018-19 school year. The Aurora City School District is proud to have earned the distinction of receiving an "A" grade for the overall mark. Superintendent, Pat Ciccantelli, shared, "It is an exciting time for the Aurora City Schools! We received notice that for the second consecutive year our district has earned the highest marks from the Ohio Department of Education as we have been awarded an overall grade of an "A" on our state report card. Only a handful of districts in Ohio earned this distinction." He added, "Congratulations to the Board of Education, administration, faculty, staff and especially the students for this level

of success! The outstanding scores on these assessments help confirm that our students and staff are doing an incredible job!"

Ohio State Superintendent of Public Instruction, Paolo DeMaria, sent a congratulatory email stating, "Congratulations on the overall A that your district received on the 2018-2019 Ohio School Report Card! Your district is one of only 31 districts in the state that achieved this highest mark. While the report cards are not the only measure of a district's success, you, your teachers, your staff and your community should be proud of this accomplishment."

AURORA CITY SCHOOL DISTRICT NEW TENNIS COURTS

The Aurora City School District (ACSD) held an inauguration celebration to introduce their new tennis courts on Tuesday, September 10, 2019. On hand at the tennis courts for the event were ACSD and City of Aurora officials, along with the Boys' and Girls' coach and tennis teams.

The new tennis courts are located between Harmon Middle School and the Aurora High School's Veterans Stadium. Nagle Athletic Surfaces was contracted for the project which began construction at the beginning of June and was completed by August 20, 2019. According to Aurora Schools'Treasurer, William Volosin, the cost of the completed project was 400,000. The ACSD and the City of Aurora collaborated on the restoration of the existing tennis courts with the city contributing a total of \$100,000 to the tennis court construction project.

The new tennis courts allow both the girls and boys tennis teams to utilize the courts for practices and home matches and gives the students in physical education classes the opportunity to also use the courts. Previously, the District rented tennis court facility space from Barrington and the Western Reserve Racquet and Fitness Club at a yearly cost of approximately \$10,000, according to ACSD Treasurer, Volosin. When the courts are not being used by the tennis teams or physical education classes, the community is invited and encouraged to eniov the new courts. The courts have also been lined to include Pickleball game dimensions. Pickleball is currently a popular outdoor game, which is played on tennis courts and combines the elements of tennis, badminton, and table tennis.

Gerald Kohanski introduced the tennis courts at the event and said, "The Aurora City School District is happy to inaugurate six new tennis courts that will provide our girls and boys high school tennis teams with a home court that they have lacked for the last several years. The

refurbishment of these courts will also allow the schools to eliminate \$10,000 in annual fees to rent home court space off our campus.

Thanks to the leadership of the Board of Education and Superintendent Pat Ciccantelli we were not only able to provide a first-class facility but also will provide the community with six Pickleball courts.

When courts are not being used by the schools for tennis matches and physical education activities, they will be available to the community. We would like to acknowledge the leadership of Mayor Ann Womer Benjamin who spearheaded the contribution by the City of \$100,000 to help defray the school's total completed cost of \$400,000. We are happy to have the City as a valued associate in the construction of the courts and believe this project will benefit both our students and the community at large."

Pat Ciccantelli stated, ""We are very appreciative of the support of the board of education and the City of Aurora to provide the financial support for these beautiful courts. They were long overdue and it is a joy to see tennis being played again on our campus."

Aurora Tennis Coach, Dania Rinicella, added, "They are beautiful! The kids are so excited and I am so happy to have a home. We would love to see lots of fans coming out to the matches now that we are on campus."

SCHOOL BUILDING SAFETY DRILLS CONDUCTED

The safety of the children, staff and guests at each of our schools is extremely important to us. To maintain a safe environment for our children to learn and grow, it is necessary to practice our emergency and crisis response plans throughout the school year by having drills designed to exercise our procedures. Throughout the year, fire drills, tornado/ weather drills, and safety drills are conducted.

Once every three years, the state of Ohio requires all school districts to complete a full scale evacuation drill as one of their required safety drills. Last spring, in conjunction with local law enforcement agencies, district administrators began planning for the full-scale drill. All school buildings in the Aurora City School District completed this type of drill in the month of October.

PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT DAY VAPING PRESENTATION

During the Aurora Schools'Teacher Professional Development Day on October 14, 2019, the owner of Vapor House, Adrian Delgado, and mechanical modification expert, Brett Duncan, gave a presentation to help teachers better understand vaping and smoking devices. Vapor House is located at 9761 OH-14, in Streetsboro, OH.

They shared their knowledge on equipment, accessories, Eliquids, and pods. The pair also answered questions on the differences between THC cartridges and nicotine cartridges and devices that are used to smoke each one. The health effects of black market products versus approved products was also discussed. Delgado and Duncan explained the cutting method of the Eliquids with vitamin E, a synthetic byproduct, and the ability of a user to create their own Eliquids.

The teachers were then given the opportunity to hold the devices and see how each one is used. Legal sale of the products was discussed, along with the sale of unethical sales that have been turned down by Vapor House. Delgado and Duncan also provided statistics for the teachers and included conversation regarding deterring student usage of the products.



The Aurora City School District would like to congratulate the Aurora High School Class of 2020 National Merit Semifinalist and Commended students. The National Merit Scholarship Program has been in existence to recognize students who are high performers on a state and national basis. The top performers are determined by the junior year PSAT. Last fall, over 1.6 million students participated in the PSAT at over 22,000 high schools. Of those students, 50,000 (1.5%) are recognized as Commended scholars, and only 16,000 are named Semifinalists, representing the top .5% of test takers in each state. Semifinalists have the opportunity to apply and compete for 7,500 scholarships with 15,000 students becoming Finalists. Commended students do not continue in the competition, however, some of the students do become candidates for special scholarships sponsored by corporations and businesses.

Superintendent, Pat Ciccantelli, said, "Congratulations to Ashley Ruehr, Sachi Sanghavi, Kathryn Walter, and Kate Walton for being our Class of 2020 National Merit Semifinalists."
