From the Superintendent

We did it! August 2020 and the reopening of schools seems like a decade ago rather than just the beginning of the most recent school year. The pandemic certainly presented some unprecedented challenges,

but thanks to the hard work of each of our staff members and the unwavering support of our families and community as a whole we have weathered at least the first part of the storm. In fact, I wanted to be sure to start this message with a thank you to our families and community members for supporting the schools over this past year. This support, combined with the time and energy from our staff members allowed us to enjoy a relatively successful year. That sentiment was shared by our families as shown in our 2020-2021 end of school feedback survey.

We had over 1100 responses to the survey which accounts for approximately 70% of the Aurora families with school aged children, so we were very appreciative of your participation. There was a nice balance of responses from families between each of our buildings relative to the number of young people in each building. As you can see in the graphic below, we also had a proportional representation of our Plan A and Plan B families.

ROBERTO PRESENTS STATE OF SCHOOLS

Aurora City Schools' Superintendent, Mike Roberto, presented his State of the Schools' Address at the City of Aurora's State of the City's Luncheon held virtually on March 3, 2021. The luncheon took place with only several socially distanced attendees and was live streamed by Community Focus.

In his address, Roberto who took over as Superintendent in August 2020, explained that, "In fact almost exactly one year ago I was honored to be named as the next superintendent of the Aurora City Schools only to have the bottom drop out when the pandemic hit us all during the ides of March. However, despite this unfortunate turn of events, the state of the Aurora City Schools is strong." He went on to say that, "Throughout the late spring and summer our administration team met each week to discuss breaking from traditional approaches to school, blending new ideas

with those that have worked in the past, and bending some of our practices to fit new requirements all in an effort to provide an innovative approach to educating young people in the middle of a pandemic. We took these ideas to our staff where they were refined and improved before sharing it with parents, community members, clergy, local health officials, Board members, classified staff, and certified staff in our newly formed Covid-19 Advisory Committee. This collaboration led to a plan which helped us to take into account the concerns and feelings of our parents while at the same time meeting the safety, academic, and social emotional needs of the young people in the schools. This emphasis on empathy as we designed learning environments for all young people allowed us to balance the needs of those who wanted to be learning in person with those who were

uncomfortable attending school physically, but needed the support academically." The District offered two plans for students one (Plan A) offering an environment which utilized safety guidelines and protocols for in person learning five days a week and the other (Plan B) which emphasized an online learning environment that allowed young people to learn from home. Approximately 75% of district students participated in the in-person learning format, while the remaining students participated in the online virtual learning format.



Roberto thanked the entire ACSD staff who made it possible for the district to offer the two plans. He said, "Teachers of both Plan A and Plan B learners worked collaboratively in their Professional Learning Communities to design learning environments both inperson and virtually which would allow young people to be critical thinkers and problem solvers despite the distractions due to the pandemic. Because of the work of the teachers and administrators we were able to meet the academic needs of each of our students no matter which plan they participated in this year."

AHS RANKED #2 IN AKRON METRO AREA, #5 IN NORTHEAST OHIO, #13 IN OHIO ~ U.S. NEWS & WORLD REPORT

This year, U.S. News & World Report magazine analyzed nearly 24,000 public high schools in all 50 states and the District of Columbia and then ranked the highestscoring public high schools in the nation. Aurora High School (AHS) was ranked by the publication at #2 in the Akron Metro Area, #5 in Northeast Ohio and #13 in the State of Ohio in their Best High Schools 2021 article. This puts AHS in the top 1% of high schools (out of 683 high schools) ranked in the State. AHS is ranked at #477in the country. The methodology used by U.S. News & World Report for the rankings focuses on six factors which include, College Readiness, Math and Reading Proficiency, Math and Reading Performance, Underserved Student Performance, College Curriculum Breadth and Graduation Rate. College readiness specifically measures participation and

performance on Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate exams. The data used in this edition is from the 2018-2019 academic school year, and therefore was not affected by the COVID-19 pandemic.

AHS Principal, Mike Hayes, said of the recognition,"As is discussed quite often in 'The Greenhouse,' we are always striving to create ideal conditions for growth. This starts with the wonderful families and community we serve providing strong roots in our young people, and from a K-12 perspective, our entire staff begins nurturing these roots leading to extraordinary outcomes. Such rankings and recognitions are a testament to our school district's focus on learnercentered growth with an emphasis on critical thinking, collaboration, balance, empathy, resiliency and innovation. We are incredibly fortunate to have such amazing students, staff and stakeholders invested in the learning process allowing our school to flourish and be recognized among the state and nation's best!"





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respondents addressed. The first dealt with the academic learning taking place during the pandemic. We were happy to see that 50% of the respondents were extremely satisfied, as represented by a




score of 5, with their child's experience this school year under the circumstances. When combining this score of 5 with the scores of 4 which indicated those who were satisfied, there was close to 84% of the families who felt their children had a relatively positive academic experience in the Aurora Schools during the pandemic.



We also asked about parents' overall opinion on the safety measures in place within the district. I am happy to report that 91% of the families in both Plan A and Plan B felt comfortable with our multi-layered approach to safety this school year.

Moving on to communication. We asked how well you, as a family, felt informed at both the district and building level. Again, the feedback from families was strong. Approximately 94% were at least satisfied with the communication at the district level with 76% stating they were extremely satisfied with the communication at the district level. At the building level a similar amount of satisfaction was expressed with 91% overall satisfaction and 70% extremely satisfied.



We appreciate families taking the time to provide this quick overview of your child's experience this year in the Aurora City School District. Though not all of our families were completely satisfied with their child's experience, we will continue to work towards designing learning environments which meet the individual needs of each of our learners or, said in another way, nurture the roots of young people.

There were a number of families who also provided some constructive feedback in written form as well. I have quickly reviewed this information to get an overall sense of some common themes, but our administration team will dive much deeper into this feedback over the summer. I did take all of the feedback from the question which asked, "What do you like about the Aurora City School District? (This school year



or in past years) and placed it into a Word Cloud generator. As a reminder, the bigger a word is represented in a word cloud the more it is mentioned in the feedback. As you can see, one of the biggest words, if not the biggest, was "Teachers." Families expressed a lot of gratitude for the work, effort, energy, and care that teachers provide this year. You might also notice words such as Great, Schools, District, Children, Students, and Learning were often mentioned. These all indicate that the families believe children are a focus of the schools and as you have heard, we believe that "Kids Come First." Another common theme was that parents loved the ability to choose between learning in person full time (Plan A) or being able to learn virtually (Plan B).

Looking forward, we have transitioned into our summer school offerings which include young people being in each of our buildings in June and July. After June 1, 2021, at midnight the Ohio Department of Health (OHD) orders for masks ended and as of June 7, 2021 masks became voluntary for all Aurora City School-sponsored events. However, we will still be following our other COVID-19 safety protocols when possible including social distancing, hand sanitizing, use of MERV 13 air filters, and cleaning protocols. It is important to note that we will still need to follow quarantine and isolation protocols for any young person or staff member who is not vaccinated because COVID-19 is classified as a Class A communicable disease.

We have been informed that the following orders are still in effect for schools: The Director's Order to Facilities to Notify Residents, Guardians, and Sponsor of Positive or Probable Cases of COVID-19 signed April 15, 2020. This means schools are still required to notify parents of cases within the school building. The Director's Order Requiring Reporting and Notification Regarding COVID-19 Cases in Kindergarten through Twelfth Grade signed September 3, 2020. This requires schools to continue to post their information on a COVID-19 Data Dashboard.

We are anticipating these same procedures to be in place for the 2021-2022 school year, but we will be sure to keep families updated as we approach the start of school in August. One initiative we do have on our RADAR for this fall is to continue to implement our strategic vision, which can be found on the Aurora City School District website (www. aurora-schools.org). Under this vision we focus on nurturing the competencies of collaboration, critical thinking, empathy, balance, innovation, and resilience as young people attend the Aurora Schools in grades PreK-12. This focus will not only help

ACSD 2021 EXTENDED LEARNING PLAN

On February 9, 2021, Ohio Governor DeWine asked school districts to work with their communities and educational stakeholders to help students continue to advance academically and to make up for any learning that may have been lost or delayed due to the coronavirus pandemic and related disruptions. DeWine then directed all public schools in Ohio to create an extended learning plan in response to the concerns of learning loss for students during the COVID-19 pandemic to be completed by April 1st. The district's plans were expected to address six key components including, Impacted Students, Needs Assessment, Resources and Budget, Partnerships and Alignment. Governor DeWine requested that schools and districts design plans that address learning recovery and extended learning opportunities to meet the needs of students that could include extending the current school year, beginning the new year early, extending the school day or instituting summer programs, tutoring, remote options, and other remedial or supplemental activities. It was suggested that,"Each district or school should consider its unique needs and issues and prepare its plan in a way that responds appropriately and leverages the assets of its unique partners...."

In response to this request, Aurora City School District's Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum and Instruction, Paul Milcetich, explained, "Certainly, the Aurora City School District is in a much different position than many school districts across the state that have not had in person instruction since last March when the pandemic originally caused the closure of schools. Therefore, our plan will look different from other school districts who may have experienced significant learning loss in their student population. We do not plan to extend the school year or begin next year early, as our students have been in school in person (roughly 80%) or virtual five days per week the entire year. Therefore, our typical processes, such as Response to Intervention, have helped us to target and intervene for those students needing extra support. Additionally, we are offering our established summer programs, such as AHS Credit Recovery/Summer School, K-3 Reading and Math Academy, as well as Extended School Year for students with special needs who qualify. We are expanding the number of students invited to our summer Reading and Math academy, along with the necessary staff to meet this demand on an as needed basis."

of Curriculum and Instruction, Paul Milcetich, said, "This recognition has been in process for more than a year and half but was delayed (at AHS) with the onset of COVID-19 and school closures last year. Many practices were already in place that assisted and recognized our military families, but the application process has formalized or highlighted ways in which AHS is military friendly. For example, Mrs. Oberlin is now the official point person who makes sure she is aware of military families district-wide and is able to connect them to each other. as well as available resources, including support from staff at each building. We now have a dedicated portion of the website which lists our local military recruiters, as well as resources to assist military families. These efforts help raise our collective staff awareness. Additionally, we have multiple events and activities meant to celebrate our local military families."

AHS Principal, Mike Hayes, explained, "At Aurora, we've always attempted to celebrate our community's connection to the military.
